Indiana University, Bloomington, one of the nation's leading research universities, invites nominations and applications for the tenured position of Professor or Associate Professor and Chair of the Department of Criminal Justice. The Department is part of the College of Arts and Sciences in the university. The College has just appointed a new Dean who is committed to helping build the Department.

The Department of Criminal Justice has a long and distinguished record of nationally recognized scholarship, teaching, and service. It has 10 full-time faculty members and a corps of adjuncts. It offers M. A. and Ph. D. degrees and participates in the University's online M. S. degree in Criminal Justice and Public Safety. Its graduate program currently has 25 active students. The department routinely has between 350 and 400 undergraduate majors. We are proud of our interdisciplinary history and wish to continue it. Faculty and students in the department address fundamental issues of crime and justice using a range of quantitative and qualitative methods. They publish in leading disciplinary and interdisciplinary journals and in the foremost university and commercial presses. A number of faculty are actively involved in grant work, having earned awards from major public agencies and private foundations. The Chair is the department's chief academic and administrative officer and is responsible for its strategic vision, budget, academic programs, faculty recruitment, mentoring and evaluation, staff oversight and evaluation, department committee assignments, communication with internal and external constituencies, and development planning. This is a full-time, 12-month position with the salary being competitive and commensurate with experience and qualifications. The candidate should have the ability and interest to work effectively with a diverse constituency, including faculty members from various disciplines, heads of other units at IU, university administrators, students, and alumni. The candidate also must have effective administrative and leadership skills, excellent interpersonal skills, a commitment to diversity, and dedication to the department's mission.

The successful candidate will have a significant record of scholarship, teaching, and service to the field. More specifically, candidates should have an earned Ph. D. in an appropriate discipline and a record of achievement sufficient to merit appointment as a tenured member of the Department. The Department will consider both full professors and advanced associate professors for the position.
